Original Recipients: Israel--Hosea reminds Israel of the Lord's loving faithfulness and calls them away from unfaithfulness to a new life (LSB 1427)

- "Hosea is a collection of oracles without a clear, logical sequence." LSB 1428
- Chapters 1 through 3: The Adulterous Wife and the Faithful Husband (God's love is capable of working through all of our sin)
- Chapters 4 through 14: The Adulterous Israel and Faithful Lord (God's love is capable of working through all of our sin)

- "I will heal their apostasy; I will love them freely, for my anger has turned from them. I will be like the dew to Israel; he shall blossom like the lily; he shall take root like the trees of Lebanon..."ESV
- "The Lord's tone changes here. He begins to announce good news to Israel. Specifically, He promises to heal the people, love them freely, and turn away His righteous anger. The imagery contrasts with the heat and dryness of judgment in 13:15." LSB 1445

#### LUTHER SAYS:

Hosea "preached vigorously against the idolatry of his time and bravely rebuked the people, together with the king and princes and priests. It was surely for this reason that he, like the others, tasted death. He had to die as a heretic against the priests and rebel against the king, for that is a prophetic and apostolic death, and in this way Christ himself had to die." LSB 1427

#### MR. MARTIN SAYS:

- "In Hosea the grace of God is illustrated in the personal life of [Hosea]..., which in turn symbolizes God's relationship with Israel. Hosea's faithfulness to his adulterous wife Gomer, whom he later forgives and redeems from the slave market, is symbolic of God's love for his people, whose willful unfaithfulness merits the judgment of God, who ultimately will restore and save his wayward people."
